Regional leadership institute recruiting first class

The Wyoming Black Hills Leadership Institute (WBHLI) is actively seeking candidates from Weston, Crook and Campbell Counties for the leadership class that will begin in September. The class will provide training in leadership concepts and techniques and prepare participants for more effective involvement in their communities. Participants will also gain a greater understanding of Black Hills-area issues, resources, industries, organizations and agencies.

The Institute consists of one full-day workshop per month for eight months. Each class session will feature different topics and speakers. Example themes include: team building, communication, planning, professionalism and ethics, conflict resolution, effective participation in coalitions, boards and foundations, and social responsibility. Classes will be rotated among communities within the three counties, with the exception of a February field trip to the Wyoming Legislature. WBHLI is open to both emerging and established leaders.

WBHLI is a non-profit organization, funded and supported by numerous community groups, agencies and businesses throughout the three counties and by the Wyoming Business Council and the UW Cooperative Extension Service. Participants may self-nominate or be sponsored by an employer or organization. There will be an application process and the class will be limited to 25 persons. Application deadline for the class is June 15. Successful applicants will be notified in July and the non-refundable registration fee is due August 1, 2004. The cost to individuals or sponsors is \$250 (which includes instruction, materials, field trip expenses and some meals).

Applicants may apply for scholarship assistance, depending upon the availability of funds. Scholarship recipients will be chosen on the basis of financial need. The course can also be taken for University of Wyoming credit.

Brochures and applications are available now from the UW Extension offices in Weston and Crook counties or from members of the Steering Committee who will be promoting the Institute in the various communities.

Quality leadership is a crucial factor determining whether small rural communities prosper or die. Communities need viable businesses, schools, local governments, health care systems, churches, human services, civic organizations, law enforcement, and so on. However, all of these entities and institutions have in common the need for competent, caring leadership.

If rural communities are to be economically stable and vibrant — places where it's safe and pleasurable to live, work and raise families — locales where opportunities exist for the next generation — it is very important to develop new leaders on a sustained basis and to phase them into meaningful roles and responsibilities.

The University of Wyoming Centennial Singers Company will present this year's show "The World Goes Round" at Sundance High School auditorium Friday, March 19, at 7:30 p.m. Centennial Singers have embarked on their tour and will use a variety of energetic singing, vigorous dancing and elaborate costumes to present an evening of non-stop entertainment.

In this year's show The World Goes 'Round Centennial Singers spans the vast musical styles of Broadway. The first act features numbers from memorable productions like *Chicago* and *Joseph* and the *Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat*. Following a brief intermission, Centennial
